Here's what the 4 'tiers of restriction' will mean for our school and the actions we'll take for each one.

4	<p>As a Primary School:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We'll only remain open for vulnerable pupils and the children of critical workers • We'll provide remote education for all other pupils • We'll maintain the same rules on face coverings on-site as in tier 3 	<p>As a Primary School:</p> <p>We will send pupils home with a hard-copy learning pack which will cover one week, this will enable teachers sufficient time to then put in place a blended learning provision.</p> <p>It is recognised that not all children have devices. An audit of provision has been carried out and the school knows where the need is.</p> <p>Additional devices have been purchased to enable all pupils from Year 4 upwards to have access to online learning.</p> <p>The 'Learning Grid' approach that was successful from the spring and summer terms of 2020 (based on feedback from both parents and pupils, and the baseline of outcomes from September 2020), will be re-established. This will provide a curriculum offer across subjects with hyperlinks to videos, animated sequences, and voice over power-points, etc.</p> <p>Teachers will be expected to provide email and phone feed-back to parents and carers.</p> <p>Teachers will NOT be live-streaming lessons.</p> <p>Vulnerable pupils</p> <p>We'll strongly encourage vulnerable pupils to continue attending school. To do this, we'll:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Work with our local authority (LA) • Contact a pupil's parent or carer, and (where applicable) social worker if the pupil doesn't attend, to find out why and discuss their concerns <p>Free school meals</p> <p>We'll work with our meals supplier to prepare meals or food parcels for all pupils eligible for free schools meals, whether they are at home or on-site.</p> <p>Staffing onsite will be from a rota-system of support staff and those senior leaders who do not have class-based responsibilities.</p>
