This week we are showcasing **Year 3's** banner on the Catholic Teaching theme of 'Options for the poor and vulnerable'. Here is what the children had to say about their banner...

God invites us to care in a special way for those who need help the most. Throughout the scriptures, Jesus spends time with the sick and outcast, revealing a special love for those most in need.

In the Gospel of Matthew (25:31-46) Jesus describes the last judgment, saying that we will be judged based on how we treat the poorest and most vulnerable members of society. He said: 'For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.'

Then the righteous will answer him and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?'

The Catholic social teaching principle Option for the Poor and Vulnerable encourages us to imitate Christ's love for the poor by working to create a society where the needs of the poor are always considered first.
